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We don't need a Cloud, we have the Holy Spirit

We have the Holy Spirit

Numbers 9:15-23 explains how the Lord led the people of Israel in the wilderness. It seems so simple. The cloud moved on, they would move on. The cloud stayed put, the Israelites would remain where the cloud resided until finally it moved on.

"18 At the LORD's command the Israelites set out, and at his command they encamped. As long as the cloud stayed over the tabernacle, they remained in camp. 19 When the cloud remained over the tabernacle a long time, the Israelites obeyed the LORD's order and did not set out. 20 Sometimes the cloud was over the tabernacle only a few days; at the LORD's command they would encamp, and then at his command they would set out. 21 Sometimes the cloud stayed only from evening till morning, and when it lifted in the morning, they set out. Whether by day or by night, whenever the cloud lifted, they set out. 22 Whether the cloud stayed over the tabernacle for two days or *a month* or a year, the Israelites would remain in camp and not set out; but when it lifted, they would set out."

As I say, it seems so simple; I think to myself, even I could figure that one out. Wouldn't it be great if following the Lord were that straight-forward?

The good news is, though we may not have a cloud hovering over our heads leading us, if we (Continued on page 2) (Continued from page 1)

have put our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, then he has poured his Holy Spirit into our hearts. And so we have the Lord, the Holy Spirit, per-

sonally leading us or at least trying to. If you notice in the passage quoted above, the Israelites had to obey. The leading only worked because they obeyed.

In the sermons on Ephesians we have been following in our sermon series, we found these words, "And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with whom you were sealed for the day of redemption. " (Ephesians 4:30) Interesting; it is clear the Holy Spirit will not force us to obey. He leads and he strengthens us to do his leading but if we choose to ignore him and disobey, he will be disappointed, saddened and be grieved but he will not make us do what we refuse to do.

What a gracious comforter and friend the Holy Spirit is. The Lord has not left us alone as orphans. He himself has come to us and abides in us. There is something alarming however about the thought that we could become hardened and unresponsive to his "nudgings" if we repeatedly ignore him. He is a person, not a force, and he can be grieved.

Another time Paul said: " Do not put out the Spirit's fire; do not treat prophecies with contempt. Test everything. Hold on to the good. Avoid every kind of evil. (1 Thessalonians 5: 19—22). Disobedience pours cold water on the fire of the Holy Spirit in our hearts.

It would appear from 1 Thessalonians 5:20 that cynicism is the enemy of the Holy Spirit. If we would laugh at the quaint form of leading- a cloud in Numbers 9, then we are in danger of despising the "prophecies" the Holy Spirit would send our way.

When we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit this Pentecost, May 11th, we are by implication committing ourselves to allow him to lead us and we are promising to obey his leading no matter how demanding his directions may be because he promises to empower us to do his will. " 11And if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through his Spirit, who lives in you. " (Romans 8:11)

Invitation to come to Christ

a sermon preached by Charles Simeon



Charles Simeon was an Anglican divine who lived 1759—1836. When Charles Simeon entered King's College, Cambridge, he discovered that attendance at Holy Communion was compulsory. His preparation for taking communion led to his conversion. From the time of his ordination, he encountered great hostility and persecution for the sake of the gospel. Appointed vicar of Holy Trinity, Cambridge in 1782, he ministered there until his death. Ed.

"The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' And let him who hears say, 'Come!' Whoever is thirsty, let him come; and whoever wishes, let him take the free gift of the water of life."

Revelation 22: 17[NIV]

RICH beyond expression are the blessings held forth to us in the Word of Life: and as free as light are the invitations given us to partake of them. Throughout the whole Scriptures, is every possible encouragement afforded to the sinners of mankind to repent of sin, and to "lay hold upon the hope that is set before them" in the Gospel. And here, in the close of the Inspired Volume, are invitations to us reiterated from every quarter, that we may be prevailed upon to accept mercy, ere the door of mercy be forever closed.

I. Let us consider,

The blessings to which we are invited—They are here designated by "the water of life." The source from which this water flows, is no other than the Lord Jesus Christ, the Saviour of the world. In the very chapter before us, "the pure river of the water of life" is said to "proceed out of the throne of God and of the Lamb." Jesus is "the fountain of living waters;" and whosoever comes to him, may drink and live forever. To the Samaritan woman he said, "If thou knewest the gift of God and who it is that saith unto thee, Give me to drink, thou wouldest have asked of him, and he would have given thee living water." [John 4: 10] On another occasion, he stood in the place of public concourse and cried, "If any man thirst, let him come unto me and drink: and out of his belly shall flow rivers of living water." [John 7: 37, 38]

Three blessings in particular I will specify, as granted by our Lord Jesus Christ to all who come to him; namely *pardon*, and *holiness*, and *glory*. The Lord Jesus will in the first place bestow the pardon of our sins. He is said by the prophet to be "the fountain opened for sin and for uncleanness:"

Burkina Faso

This summer, I will be embarking on a mission trip to Burkina Faso with S.I.M (Serving in Mission) from July 17th to August 21st. As one of the six young women on the Burkina Faso team, I am getting very excited for what God has in store for us. I have had Africa, and especially missions in Africa on my heart for the past year or two, and it is so wonderful finally to have the opportunity to go and serve where God has called me.


Burkina Faso is located in West Africa, landlocked and directly north of Ghana and the Ivory Coast. It is about a third of the size of Ontario, has a population of 14 million. It is one of the poorest countries in the world. This sub-Saharan country has three seasons: hot, hot and dry, and hot and wet. We will be in Burkina during its wet season which is not very long and is still very hot; it will be between 40°-50°C.

We will be staying in a small town about 30 minutes from the capital of Burkina, Ouagadougou. There is an S.I.M guesthouse that our group will be staying in which has access to phones, computers and internet. We will have to cook our own meals and barter for goods and food from the local market every day.

A lot of our days will be spent at a small Muslim village, Sakoula, about 25 minutes from the S.I.M guesthouse. We will be interacting with many of the children through games and VBS (Vacation Bible School). This village is very poor so most of the children cannot afford schooling. Some of the village women have a small berry selling business started to make money for these children. We will be helping them in developing this. The main religion in Burkina is Muslim (50%), then the various tribal and traditional (30%), Catholic (15%) and Protestant (5%). There is also a very strong animistic culture (belief that everything, nature etc... has a soul) among the people of Burkina. We are all very excited to share our faith about Jesus to these Muslims. Most of our ministry will be sharing the Gospel one on one and making relationships with the people of this village.

In Ouagadougou we will be involved in the International Church of Ouagadougou and their youth. There is a need for musical talents in this church, so I am very excited to offer my gifts in voice and piano to this church in their worship services.

Please pray for the preparation of our trip, that we would have the knowledge to bring all that is necessary and that God would prepare our hearts for this adventure He has put before us. Pray for protection spiritually, physically and emotionally while we are in Burkina and that we would be a blessing to the people in the places we will be serving. Pray for the Holy Spirit to guide us and bring Christ's salvation among the many that need Him.



Compelled by Christ's Love

I wanted to get an early report to you about the ANiC conference this past weekend. It is not a report of content so much as feelings. You have already received a short synopsis of content from ANiC directly, and I highly recommend ordering the full DVD set (and nobody's paying me for this endorsement!).

As many of you know I have been involved in other conferences with the technical production aspects. This time was different. Both Karen and I awoke on Friday with the exact same thought. "There's nothing to look after, chase down, or organize. We can go and just participate." So we did! The first impression was that there were so many people. About 350 registered including 15 from St. Georges, and many more for special services. It is very heartening to meet others from all across Canada, North America and indeed, around the world. We are not "alone in the wilderness".

The first worship service set the tone for the whole conference. We were there not to wallow in our particular hardships, or rejoice in specific "victories", but to give praise and worship to The Lord. Archbishop Greg once again demonstrated that he"puts his pants on one leg at a time" just like us. There was no high and lofty dissertation about some obscure passage or problematic concept. Just straightforward fact and direction based on Galatians 1:1-6 and Acts 2:42. The best little tidbit I received from Archbishop Greg that summarized both the problem and solution was a farming directive from Australia. If a shepherd cares to provide for the flock and have them flourish, he doesn't build bigger fences to keep them in. He digs deeper wells for better water!

Other presentations made us very aware of what can be attained if we preach the Gospel faithfully. There was a special session on youth specifically. And to prove what can become of a youth presence, the service Friday evening had (I guess) about 100 young people participating. They wanted and chose to be there on a Friday night pre-empting all those "normal" youth activities like dates, work, and parties!

Saturday's sessions continued on evangelism today beginning with rich Bible study showing how the Gospel is 1) Christological, 2) Biblical 3) Theological 4) Cosmic (David Short couldn't find himself using "cosmical" for a couple of reasons) and 5) Personal. Most presentations were followed by a panel discussion and audience questions to make sure that we were engaged at a real world level.

The final commissioning service (I am told it was 2 hours, but certainly it didn't seem that long) was truly wonderful. No shortage of tears (even as I write this now) at several times. God is moving.

One aspect that I would like to bring back to all of us is that of <u>sacrifice and support</u>. There are those among us that have sacrificed much indeed so that we as a congregation and as individuals can be at this place (both spiritual and physical) in this time, growing and worshipping in truth. At the final service, there was a time of prayer, thanks and support for Archbishop Greg, Bishops Don and Malcolm, and other leaders. We, locally, do give thanks and must continue to support Charlie& Judy, Ray David& Rhonda, Neil& Donna, Ron& Pam, Garth& Margaret, their entire families, and the staff and support here at St. George's. This is not optional! Karen and I thank all for your prayers surrounding this trip. We were blessed in so many ways. It is our desire that we convey the blessing of the conference to you. When the DVDs come out I will be setting up a time (or times) that we can gather together and watch parts or all. I suggest that Archbishop Greg's address could be come a sermon on a Sunday. 



PRAYERFULLY SPEAKING

ALTOGETHER LOVELY

Has it ever occurred to you how odd it is that nowhere in the four gospel accounts is there a physical description of Jesus? Even in the epistles written by Peter, James and John who were eyewitnesses to the events of Jesus' adult life, there is no attempt to convey to their readers Jesus' appearance. If a child in your Sunday School class asked you, "What did Jesus look like?" what would you say? Was He tall? Short? Dark hair? Did He look as He is depicted in medieval art or stained-glass windows? Did He look at all like any of the actors who have portrayed Him in movies?

We've just recently come through a wonderful celebration of Holy Week and Easter, and, perhaps it is on Good Friday that, more than at any other time, we contemplate His appearance because of how He was so cruelly mistreated by the Romans. If you've seen Mel Gibson's *The Passion,* you'll understand what I mean. This year, on Good Friday evening, my wife and I watched the very moving account of the crucifixion in Franco Zefferelli's classic mini-series, *Jesus of Nazareth.* The scene that always wrenches my heart and often brings me to tears occurs when Nicodemus approaches Calvary, unable to tear his eyes away from his dying Lord. As he watches in horror, he begins to quote from Isaiah 52 and 53, the description of the Suffering Servant:-

"See, my servant will act wisely;

he will be raised and lifted up and highly exalted.

Just as there were many who were appalled at him—

his appearance was so disfigured beyond that of any man

and his form marred beyond human likeness"-

[Isaiah 52: 13-14 NIV]

"He grew up before him like a tender shoot,

and like a root out of dry ground.

He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire

him.

He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. Like one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted. But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed". [Isaiah 53: 2-5 NIV]

There are no doubt many good reasons why God chose not to have the New Testament writers include a description of Jesus' appearance in His humanity. Prophetically, Isaiah seems to suggest that there was nothing in His appearance that was striking or majestic, nothing to draw undue attention to Him. But the question I want to pose in our meditation this month is – How beautiful is your Jesus? Not the way you picture Him as a man from Galilee, but how do you see Him now, as you pray or worship? What does He look like with the eyes of your heart?

In the first chapter of the apostle John's Revelation, we are given a glimpse of what the heavenly Jesus might look like. John uses images like, "His head and hair were white like wool, as white as snow, and His eyes were like blazing fire. His feet were like bronze, glowing in a furnace, and His voice was like the sound of rushing waters... His face was like the sun, shining in all its brilliance". What is apparent here is that we have a majestic, magnificent Lord whose beauty and omnipotence virtually defy description. John grasps for comparisons that can do justice to the Divine Person that he sees.

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and all who come to wash in that fountain are cleansed from all their sins. In it even "sins of a crimson dye" are made "white as snow:" As it is said, "The blood of Jesus Christ cleanseth from all sin." [I John 1:7]

For the purpose of *holiness* also shall this gift be bestowed: For, by the prophet Ezekiel, he says, "I will sprinkle clean water upon you and ye shall be clean: from all your filthiness and from all your idols will I cleanse you. And I will put my Spirit within you and cause you to walk in my statutes, and to keep my judgments to do them."[Ezek. 36: 25 - 27]

Eternal *glory* also will he confer upon them: for when they have "washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb, he will lead them unto living fountains of waters," [Revelation 7:14, 16] and will cause them to "drink of the rivers of pleasure which are at God's right hand for evermore." [Psalm 36:8, Psalm 16:11].

II. Let us turn our attention to the invitation itself. Here we cannot but notice the very peculiar *urgency* and *freeness* of it.

1. The urgency, to overcome reluctance—

The Spirit says, "Come." The Holy Spirit of God has undertaken the office of revealing Christ to men, and of bringing sinners to Christ for the remission of their sins [John 16: 8, 14]. He descended visibly on the day of Pentecost for these ends; and by the ministry of the apostles, as also by his operation on the souls of men, wrought powerfully upon multitudes, whom he "made willing in the day of his power," and effectually subdued to the obedience of faith. Thus at this time also is he carrying on the work that has been assigned to him in the economy of Redemption. In the written word, he speaks to us: by the ministry of his servants he pleads with us: by the convictions which he fastens on our mind and conscience, he strives with us individually; if by any means he may constrain us to accept the blessings offered to us in the Gospel. His voice to us every day and hour is , "Come," come to Christ as the Saviour of your soul.

The Bride also says, "Come." The Bride is the Church, the Lamb's wife, who has experienced in her own person all the blessedness of that salvation which she is so desirous of imparting to all around her. She then unites with the Spirit of God in saying to all around her, "Come:" see in me what he both can and will do for you also; however far off you

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may now be, you may draw nigh to him with a full assurance of acceptance with him.

"Let him that heareth, say, 'Come." Those to whom the foregoing invitations are announced, should unite their efforts to make them known, and to induce every creature under heaven to accept them. Think not, Brethren, that you have performed your duty when you have heard these invitations from the lips of your minister; no, nor when you have yourselves complied with his advice. You are all to be Preachers in your own circles; all to repeat to your friends and relatives, your families and dependents, the glad tidings which you hear of a free and full salvation; and with one heart and one voice, should join in saying to all around you, "Come, come, come."

2. The freeness—

We are all invited to "take of the water of life freely." If we are athirst, we are the very persons whose names, if I may so speak, are especially written on the cards of invitation. It may be, however, that some may say, "I am not sufficiently athirst to be able to appropriate to myself this character. I should be glad to obtain the mercy of the Lord; but I do not pant after it "as the hart after the water-brooks", and therefore I have not in myself the qualification that is here required. To counteract such desponding fears, the Saviour says, "Whosoever will, let him take of the water of life freely." If you have not all the thirst that you can wish, have you the inclination? have you the desire? Then you are the person invited: and you must not dream of staying till you can bring certain qualifications along with you, but come and take these blessings "freely", "without money and without price."

Take then this passage; and rely upon it; and plead it with him; and expect the accomplishment of it to your own soul. You shall find that the Saviour is not "a fountain sealed," but "a fountain opened;" and "out of that well of salvation you shall drink water with joy" for evermore.

"The Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' And let him who hears say, 'Come!' Whoever is thirsty, let him come; and whoever wishes, let him take the free gift of the water of life."
