

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Martin Luther servant of God 1483-1546



Just a few weeks ago I went fishing in Algonquin park. Bryan, his brother Scott, Matty and I loaded

the car to the roof (literally!) after our St. G -Milton service and drove up to Smoke Lake. After a 3 1/2 hour drive we arrived at the boat launch, emptied the car, loaded the boat and set out for the Hunt's cottage. We piled into the freezing cold cottage around midnight, tucked the littlest dude into his bed and stayed up late for some gracefilled dude-bonding time; the kind of time you can only have with faithful brothers in the wilds of the park.

The next morning we awoke to fresh, crisp air and a calm, cold lake reflecting the bril-

liant autumn colours on the surrounding hills. We spent most of the day on the lake, canoeing and trolling for lake trout.

I am telling this story to paint a picture in your mind. If you are like me, just the description of such a time and place evokes deep emotion. Is there anything more beautiful than Algonquin park in early October? The lakes, the trees, the wildlife all sing out the glory of their creator. Now that's beauty.

So, now back to reality — my suburban reality anyway.

After a few days at home and back into my rhythm Smoke lake seems a lifetime away. Sitting in people-crowded coffee shops, phones ringing off the hook, emails piling up at a rate of over 100 per day, conference calls, crisscrossing the continent for meetings all make my simple (Continued on page 2)

soul cry out for the beauty of solitude. A lake, a canoe, a fishing rod and trees.

Stationary bikes are a recent addition to my suburban life. Sweating at the gym gives me time to listen to my iPod — usually the daily office or the bible in a year. But last week I listened to a teaching by Tim Keller, recommended to me by Joe Biggar (the king of online sermons!). Tim's teaching changed me.

He was looking at the story of Jonah and the great city of Nineveh. His big point was that God cares about redeeming cities — a good point and one well-made by a master orator.



He arrived at the point in the story where Jonah is angry that God had relented and spared Nineveh despite their halfhearted repentance. Jonah's anger was compounded by the wilting of his shade plant that had grown for his comfort over night.

Highlighting the difference between men and God, Keller said something like this (my paraphrase, not a direct quote), "We put pictures of trees (and plants) on our calendars. God has pictures of subway cars filled with people."

His point — God cares about nature, He created it and will redeem it along with everything else; but his crowning creation, the thing most beautiful in his eyes is not the autumn scene in Algonquin park. God revels in the beauty of people. Crowded cities, sprawling suburbs — now that's beautiful to the Master.

Can we see our cities and our towns the way God sees them?

GOD'S HEART FOR NINEVEH "And should not I pity Nineveh, that great city, in which there are more than 120 000 persons who do not know their right hand from their left, and also much cattle?" Jonah 4: 11 [ESV]

Can we see our cities and towns the way God sees them? Does finding yourself in a crowded coffee shop or a packed subway car evoke the same awe as sitting in a canoe surrounded by trees and water? God, give me eyes to see the beauty and a heart that beats for the loveliness of the people for whom Christ died.

You need to know the impact that your sweet gesture of donating the stuffed animals to our department has made. I have x-rayed a young boy recently who was terrified to be at



hospital. He had a very bad fracture (broken bone) in his elbow and was in so much pain. I hand-picked a tiger stuffed animal and presented it to him before I took his x-rays and told him he would have to be as brave as a tiger while he was at hospital. He was able to muster up enough courage to endure the positioning for the x-rays never letting go of his little tiger! I am not sure he would have done as well if he didn't have a little friend to cling to!

In another instance, a little girl from Romania who spoke very little English was also frightened to be having her x-rays because it was difficult to explain to her that x-rays do not hurt. When we finished her exam I gave her a little red bear and her eyes lit up with excitement. It made me feel so good to make her feel so happy!

I smile every time I look at the bin of stuffed animals and think of the little children that have been so thoughtful to donate them to our department. Thank you so much for your kindness.

# CHRISTMAS ADOPT-A-FAMILY

When you receive this issue of By George, Christmas will be less than two months away. Again, St. George's will be supporting the Christmas St. Matthew's House Adopt-a-Family program. Have you begun to think about gifts and all the activities that are associated with Christmas? Would you like to consider a special way to share your Christmas with someone less fortunate than you? If so, I invite you to join with fellow parishioners from St. George's in making a more joyful Christmas for a low income family by supporting the St. Matthew's House Adopt-a-Family program. For over 44 years, St. Matthew's House has given Christmas new meaning for thousands of families. Every year the number grows. Last year they helped over 3000 individuals who through poverty, unemployment and economic hardship had insufficient income to make Christmas a special day.

As a church we would "adopt" **one or more** families at the cost of \$125 - \$175 per family depending on the size of the family, and provide for them:

- A winter jacket/coat for younger children
- Toys for children or suitable gifts for teenagers in attendance at school
- A food voucher from Fortino's in Hamilton to cover the cost of their Christmas dinner of meat/fowl, potatoes, vegetables, and dessert.
   Fortino's do not reimburse any unspent money from food vouchers but require all of the money to be spent in the store on food items, thereby assuring all of the money is spent on food.

Envelopes marked "for St Matthew's House" will be in your church bulletins on Sunday, November 22 and November 29, 2009. Please place your gift in the labeled envelope on the offering plate not later than December 6. Cheques should be made payable to ANiC, Milton Project, with the notation "St. Matthew's Adopt-a-Family" in the memo line. Please be sure to include your name and address for income tax purposes.







# Pray For US... November 8: International Day of Prayer for the Persecuted Church "Pray for us". This is the plea of persecuted Christians around the world. Today around the world over 200 million are suffering for their faith in Jesus Christ. This year's theme: "Persecuted: Not Abandoned" [II Cor. 4: 7-9] "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that the surpassing power belongs to God and not to us. We are afflicted in every way, but not crusbed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed.":



### a treasure to change the world

What would be your reaction if you picked up a Bible for the first time? What follows are the stories of two men who found a long lost treasure. The first story is recorded in the Old Testament, 2 Chronicles 34: 8 - 31. It is the story of Josiah, King of Judah, 640-609 B.C., who found the Book of the God's Law, buried away in the temple that had fallen into disuse long before. The second tale is similar. It is the story of Martin Luther (1483-1546) who found a Bible hidden away in the library at Erfurth, in Germany when he was a student there. This story is found in J. H. Merle D'Aubigné's 'History of the Great Reformation of the Sixteenth Century' (1846).

#### KING JOSIAH

Now in the eighteenth year of his reign, when he had cleansed the land and the house, he sent Shaphan the son of Azaliah, and Maaseiah the governor of the city, and Joah the son of Joahaz, the recorder, to repair the house of the LORD his God. They came to Hilkiah the high priest and gave him the money that had been brought into the house of God, which the Levites, the keepers of the threshold, had collected from Manasseh and Ephraim and from all the remnant of Israel and from all Judah and Benjamin and from the inhabitants of Jerusalem. And they gave it to the workmen who were working in the house of the LORD. And the workmen who were working in the house of the LORD gave it for repairing and restoring the house. They gave it to the carpenters and the builders to buy guarried stone, and timber for binders and beams for the buildings that the kings of Judah had let go to ruin. And the men did the work faithfully. Over them were set Jahath and Obadiah the Levites, of the sons of Merari, and Zechariah and Meshullam, of the sons of the Kohathites, to have oversight. The Levites, all who were skillful with instruments of music, were over the burden-bearers and directed all who did work in every kind of service, and some of the Levites were scribes and officials and gatekeepers.

While they were bringing out the money that had been brought into the house of the LORD, Hilkiah the priest found the Book of the Law of the LORD given

#### MARTIN LUTHER

"Luther as a young student spent in the library of the university the moments he could snatch from his academic labours. Books being then scarce, it was in his eyes a great privilege to be able to profit by the treasures of this vast collection.

One day, (he had been then two years at Erfurth, and was twenty years of age,) he was opening the books in the library one after another in order to read the names of the authors. One which he opened in its turn drew his attention. He had not seen anything like it until that hour. He read the title:-- it is a Bible! a rare book, unknown at that time. His interest is strongly excited; he is filled with astonishment at finding more in this volume than those fragments of the gospels and epistles which the church has selected to be read to the people in their places of worship every Sunday in the year. Till then he had thought that they were the whole word of God. And here are so many pages, so many chapters, so many books, of which he had no idea! His heart beats as he holds in his hand all the Scriptures divinely inspired.

With eagerness and indescribable feelings he turns over those leaves of God's word. The first page that arrests his attention, relates the history of

through Moses. Then Hilkiah answered and said to Shaphan the secretary, "I have found the Book of the Law in the house of the LORD." And Hilkiah gave the book to Shaphan. Shaphan brought the book to the king, and further reported to the king, "All that was committed to your servants they are doing. They have emptied out the money that was found in the house of the LORD and have given it into the hand of the overseers and the workmen." Then Shaphan the secretary told the king, "Hilkiah the priest has given me a book." And Shaphan read from it before the king.

And when the king heard the words of the Law, he tore his clothes. And the king commanded Hilkiah, Ahikam the son of Shaphan, Abdon the son of Micah, Shaphan the secretary, and Asaiah the king's servant, saying, "Go, inquire of the LORD for me and for those who are left in Israel and in Judah, concerning the words of the book that has been found. For great is the wrath of the LORD that is poured out on us, because our fathers have not kept the word of the LORD, to do according to all that is written in this book."...

Then the king sent and gathered together all the elders of Judah and Jerusalem. And the king went up to the house of the LORD, with all the men of Judah and the inhabitants of Jerusalem and the priests and the Levites, all the people both great and small. And he read in their hearing all the words of the Book of the Covenant that had been found in the house of the LORD. And the king stood in his place and made a covenant before the LORD, to walk after the LORD and to keep his commandments and his testimonies and his statutes, with all his heart and all his soul, to perform the words of the covenant that were written in this book. [ESV] Hannah and the young Samuel. He reads, and can scarcely restrain his joyful emotion. This child whom his parents lend to the Lord as long as he liveth; Hannah's song in which she declares that the Lord raiseth up the poor out of the dust and lifteth up the beggar from the dunghill, to set him among princes; the young Samuel who grows up in the temple before the Lord; all this history, all this revelation which he has discovered, excites feelings till then unknown. He returns home with a full heart....

MARTIN LUTHER continued

He soon returned to the library to find his treasure again. He read and re-read, and then in his surprise and joy, he went back to read again. The first gleams of a new truth then arose in his mind.

Thus has God caused him to find His word! He has now discovered the book of which he is one day to give to his countrymen that admirable translation in which the Germans for three centuries have read the oracles of God. For the first time, perhaps, this precious volume has been removed from the place that it occupied in the library at Erfurth. This book, deposited upon the unknown shelves of a dark room, is soon to become the book of life to a whole nation. The Reformation lay hid in that Book"

> J.H. Merle D'Aubigné History of the Great Reformation of the Sixteenth Century

What does God use to spark reformation? It is the Scriptures! No famine is as deadly as a famine for hearing the Word of God (Amos 8:11,12). If we are truly looking to God for fresh fire in our day, fire of reformation and renewal, let us come to the fire of God's Word(Jer 23:29). We need the fire in our bones! Lord, give us eyes to see, ears to hear, and hearts to understand!
