K e Bombay told me this story coffee one day. He told me of a time when he

was a child - a pastor's kid. He was in bed, pretending to sleep all the while listening in on his parent's conversation. You see the kitchen was directly beneath his room and the hole where the old stove pipe came up through the floor was wide open, offering the perfect conduit for little ears.

With deep concern, Ken's pastor dad said to his wife, "It has been 6 weeks since anyone has come to the Lord at church. What's wrong?" They talked for a while. Ken's dad decided to to prayer; fasting and

prayer.

Day after day little Ken would come home from school for lunch and hear his dad in his study calling out in prayer, pleading with the Lord to send repentance and revival in their congregation. After two weeks of fasting and prayer, Ken came home for lunch and upon opening the door heard his dad erupting in prayer in other tongues. family home was electric with the dynamic presence of the Living God.

That Sunday revival broke out in their church in western Canada. Nothing was ever the same. Steady streams of people came to faith in Christ and were empowered by the Holy Spirit for lives of service. So it was because a pastor of a small church refused to let businessas-usual creep in. Ken's dad anticipated and even expected repentance and revival to follow

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gospel ministry. When 6 consecutive Sundays passed without direct signs he took on the spiritual discipline of fasting

"'And in the last days

and prayer on behalf of his people.

it shall be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit on all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams: even on my male serants and female servants in those days I will pour out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy. And I will show wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and vapor of smoke; the sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood. before the day of the Lord comes. the great and magnificent day. And it shall come to pass that everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

ACTS 2:17-21 [ESV]

Every hair on my body stood on end as Ken shared this story with me. I thought, "I want to be THAT guy."

Dear brothers and sisters, this Advent I will be fasting and praying for you and for our church. I will be journeying through a season of repentance, anticipation and expectancy; looking for the Lord to show up in power in our midst.

Business activities were quite light this year as the ordination of the bishops was a main focus. It was truly a Spirit filled event, where the truth of the gospel was held high. It was both an emotional and uplifting experience. It was a joy to hear all of the reports from the many new parishes, projects and church plants, including the three associated with St. George's: Church of the Messiah, St. Paul Anglican Bible Church (Stoney Creek), and the Toronto Centre ANiC Project.

There was lots of opportunity to get to know the delegates from the other churches over the great food served daily. I particularly enjoyed hearing about what God is doing on the island of Montreal. God has met one need after the other so that in less than a year there are two thriving churches one of which has over 130 in weekly attendance.

We were blessed to have many bishops in attendance from the other diocese of the ACNA, as well as the primate, Archbishop Robert Duncan. Synod concluded with the consecration and ordination of three new bishops including our beloved Charlie, three men of God who are up for the task. Bishop Charlie has responsibility for the East (including Ontario), and Bishop Trevor (Walters) has responsibility for the West. Bishop Stephen (Leung) has responsibility for Asian congregations in North America.



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The Christmas Hope



"... the people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, ..."

[Matthew 4: 16, ESV]

Our world is woefully short on hope this Christmas period. The effects of a long recession have spread hopelessness everywhere. It seems more pandemic than the H1N1 virus. For instance, the improving employment statistics are not so improved as they appear. Experts tell us that thousands of Canadians have simply dropped out of the job market. They have given up hope and are no longer looking for work. More gloom. Recent polls inform us that one third of Canadians will buy less



this Christmas. [Now if that money were going to charity, it would be a blessing, but that doesn't seem to be the case.] So stores are feverishly trying to lure consumers back. The government fears the impact on an already shaky economy.

Our military solution coupled with economic assistance for Afghanistan was born in hope that we could liberate that country from oppression. Now we are told that the democratic government is corrupt, the Taliban is growing stronger, and we are losing the battle. The caskets conveyed along the Highway of Heroes continue, augmenting the statistics of our war dead. Closer to home, violence is on the rise in our cities. We are losing hope that our streets will ever be safe again.

Recently, I was given the gift of a book from two of our nephews. It is the reprint of Colson's "God and Government". In its pages, I was reminded of the philosophies of despair that filled our universities when I was young. Frederick Nietzsche's anti-Christian ethic spawned the horrors of Naziism. Later also came the God-is-Dead movement of the 1960's. Another, Ernest Hemingway, chose suicide because death was "an old whore" as he said, and the existence of God was in grave doubt. Lastly, Jean-Paul Sartre wrote "... on a shuttered and deserted stage, without script, prompter, or audience, the actor is free to improvise his own part."

In the wake of the resulting existential vacuum, the atheists developed a "scientific humanism" to give some kind of moral compass. It was meant to eliminate any faith in any religious system. It failed miserably. Hope was so devalued that it devalued human life with it. Consequently, in this year of our Lord 2009, we have rampant abortion, a mounting crusade for assisted suicide, and a renewed call for eugenics (selective breeding). Such is the approaching demise of hope in our culture.

Thank God that there is a REAL alternative to blowing our brains out with all this negativity, or trying to drown it with drugs, alcohol, and "stuff". It is the Christmas HOPE. It comes in the news of St. Matthew that a great LIGHT has appeared in our darkness. If we can reclaim the same humility that moved Judean shepherds to crawl through the opening of a cave-stable two millennia ago, St. Luke gives us added hope. And we will find the glow of that light illuminating the dark, scary places of our souls and of our culture.

There is hope in Christ—the Word made flesh invading the darkness of our planet with eternal lumination.

There is hope in Christ—the crucified One who died in my place.

My hope is built on nothing less than Jesus' blood and righteousness

There is hope in Christ—risen from the grave; death has lost its sting.

☐ There's a light in the valley of death now for me, since Jesus came into my heart.

There is hope in Christ—ascended to glory. He is there at the Father's right hand. The book of Hebrews 6:19, 20 assures every believer that we have an anchor of hope "beyond the veil". He is our Intercessor and Advocate in the courts of God Almighty.

There is hope in Christ—returning in glory. The Scriptures call it "the blessed hope". The Prince of Peace will one day bring lasting peace to our weary world.

The Light that shone into the oppression in a small Palestinian village called Bethlehem, that light cradled in a manger, is our shining Hope this Christmas.

■ Yet in thy dark street shineth the everlasting Light

The hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

May I, on behalf of Christ, invite you home to hope today? The invitation is in the form of the chorus on an old Gospel song:

☐ Come to the light, 'tis shining for thee;

Sweetly the Light has dawned upon me.

Once I was blind, but now I can see

The Light of the world is Jesus.

We now have three children from the Deck joining us for Sunday school. What a wonderful oppor-

tunity to show them God's love. Being a Christian is an unexpected and exciting adventure; through this adventure we grow. This church is growing in many ways and we give God all the glory.

As three of us gathered one Saturday to set up for the Sunday service we recognized a need for some bookshelves to house our library. Now most Saturday mornings end with a trip to the Salvation Army Store in Norwich. This Saturday was no different. Before we went over to the store, we prayed, 'Lord, you know our needs and we need some bookcases for our library, so we are asking you to provide them for us'. When we got to the front door of the Salvation Army store, there was a sign on the window saying, "all furniture fifty percent off'. We found not one, but two bookcases. - ♦ The sword in upright position forms a cross, representing Christ, of whom Paul said, "We preach Christ crucified" (1 Corinthians 1:23).
- ♦ The sword also symbolizes Paul's martyrdom. As a Roman citizen, Paul could not be crucified nor stoned, the two most common means of execution, but rather was accorded the "honour" of beheading by sword.
- The book represents God's Word in Holy Scripture including the many epistles written by Paul.
- ♦ The tongues of flame represent the Holy Spirit.
- ♦ The chains representing the imprisonment of Paul in Rome, are broken to represent our freedom in Christ.

Following our "naming" as St. Paul Anglican Bible Church, our Lord provided us with a new logo. This is now proudly displayed on a large banner on the stage behind our altar

table. The centrepiece of this banner is, of course, a large cross. Little by little the gym at John Knox Christian School is looking more like a sanctuary. We know that it is not the 'dressings' that make us a church, however they do bring in the elements of our Anglican traditions and liturgy.
